Will the Proud and Feminine Marcella Duran Please Stand Up?

he *Forever Tango* website writes, "Marcella Duran is a dance teacher for the Argentine government, specializing in modern dance." She toured with tango companies in Japan, Europe and the United States. In 1996 she appeared in the *Spoleto Festival* in Italy. Lately, however, Duran performed for the series, *Evenings at Pops*, with the Boston Pops Orchestra broadcast by PBS. In 2000, she and Gavito became the IDO World Professional Argentine Tango Champions and all of this while still performing in *Forever Tango* and teaching around the world anywhere people dance the tango.

Tango Noticias: My first question— how did you start dancing tango?

Marcella Duran: My first contact with the tango was many years ago, when I was born. My father was a Bandoneón player. But after a while my father stopped playing tangos. So, when this happened my family did not listen to any more tangos. Tangos for some reason became taboo in my family. I then started to dance ballet and modern dance. After which I decided to go to the milongas to learn to dance the tango. This was a big scandal in my family. My mother said that tango is not for me and that I should be studying other things but not dancing the tango. My parents did not want me to become a professional dancer at first either. This was because they did not think that I would be able to find work. But when I started to dance tango. I started by walking and walking—no steps, no patterns, just walking. Oh God so much walking! I learned how to move my feet; I learned how they should touch the floor when I dance.

TN: What do you think motivates other people to start dancing tango?

MD: I think that in some countries people need a way of connection to each other. The couples need a point of connection that is different from anything else they have experienced, different than sex or love. Some couples that come to the class — they say that they

have found a new way of connecting to each other. They say that they have found a new point of connection because of the tango. They say that they connect better with their partner now that they have been learning the tango. In this fast society in which we live tango is a way that people can stop and reconnect with each other. This happens in every country anywhere tango is danced.

TN: Are there differences between the way that the tango is danced in Buenos Aries and everywhere else?

MD: Well...I think that one of the differences is that there is no space on the dance floor in Argentina. So the embrace is closer and the steps are smaller because there is no space, no room, to do long patterns. I think that people in other countries can dance the way Argentineans do if they slow down, but the most important thing is to feel the music. If they feel the music than they can get it. It is not that you have to be an Argentinean to dance the tango well. But you have to like the music. Dancing tango in Buenos Aires is different than anywhere else. Something happens when dancing tango there. For example, when I dance with Gavito in Argentina I can, I mean, 'we,' can do things that we could never repeat in any other place. It is the atmosphere, the place, the crowd, the people, sometimes we have to go back to Buenos Aires to remember what we did.

TN: Since you brought up the topic of Gavito. Is your relationship with him purely professional?

MD: We are friends. He is one of my best friends.

TN: It seems like a lot of tango couples from Argentina are creating their own shows. What do you think about so many different couples creating their own shows?

MD: Well for me I like to be on the stage and the show does this for me. So for me I do not need to create another show because I found *Forever Tango* and

Forever Tango found me. Even if people make shows that are in the fashion of Forever Tango the shows are going to be different because we as humans beings are different creatures. I feel proud to be part of Forever Tango. We are doing things that other people do not or can not do because we are always growing and trying to do new things. For me I do not need something else, a new show or something, to feel complete because I have Forever Tango. Others might need that.

TN: There have been some changes to 'Forever Tango' could you explain?

MD: My part with Gavito did not change. Some people changed — some went and some came. One of the changes is about the music. We have added new music. But my part has not really changed besides some of the music being new. I think that the changes are beautiful; I like them a lot. The last part is different and it is very beautiful.

TN: You won the **Tango Championships** in Miami a few months ago. Why did you do it? Would you do it again?

MD: We are crazy — that is why we did it. Seriously, though, we were in Miami already so we did not travel special for the competition. We decided to go because we wanted to show people who are ballroom dancers and not tango specialists what is Argentinian tango. For Gavito and I the championship was a way to show people what we think real tango is and how it is danced. We had a lot to risk because we are professionals and the name of Forever Tango is attached to us. What if we lost? Oh my God...we also went because the judges there were not Argentineans. They did not know about the tango. There were rules about the competition that we did not know about, either. It is something that I would never do again, though. It was a once in life thing; I have no reason to do it ever again. At the competition there were beautiful dancers but they did not dance Argentine tango the way I think of Argentine tango. Some did but also some didn't. I think that in this type of thing people start to copy the last year's winner. We did not even

dance like the show — we danced for us; not for a show but for us — the way we do in a milonga. It was great because they played the Argentine national anthem when we won. They played it for us. People in Argentina do not even know that such a competition exists. I think that they would think that it is weird to compete in the tango.

TN: Do degrees of dominance and submission and victimization come into effect in the way that women dance the tango?

MD: I do not think that the woman is submissive. Men and women are different — that is clear. But it is not like one is more or less important in the dance. Because I am a woman I am different from you because you are a man. Because I am the woman in the relationship I decide who to dance with and how. It is true that I follow but I think that it is more work when compared to the work of the man. The parts of the man and woman are different but one is not more or less important than the other one. It is not submissive or domination. To me it is an exchange of energy. And my female energy is different then your masculine energy. We have a different body and a different shape; we are different in everything. But we fit together. So we have different roles in the dance. I put a lot of work into my dancing. I am not a pet that comes when I am called. I am proud to be a woman. I put in 50% and the man puts in 50%. One is not more important than the other. My energy changes his energy. To really dance tango — to really dance — you do not feel that you are two people dancing but a part of a couple that dances the tango. To really dance the tango it does not matter who leads and who follows — you are just dancing. It is better to dance without thinking about it and to just move to the music. The only domination is by the music.
