Tango sans frontières: Men and Women in the Modern Tango World

I arrive in Paris in the middle of the month-long Tango Festival. Dancers, singers and orchestras from Buenos Aires perform almost every night at Challot theater, a grand palace on a hill. On my first Saturday night I attend a dance at Challot; it's held in the spacious lobby on the second floor. Along the outer wall, floor-to-ceiling windows face the Eiffel Tower, only a few blocks from the palace; after dark the tower flickers with light.

French women, and Americans who have been to France, tell me that Frenchmen—particularly Parisians—are not at ease in asking women to dance. They tend to dance with a single partner or friends; an outsider has a slim chance of being asked. My Parisian friends are anxious to see if my 'come-hither-I'd-like-to-dance-look', so

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effective in Buenos Aires, will get results here. They warn me that all I will get from them is a blank stare reminiscent of a placid cow.

So I try; and I do get asked but — the man is Argentinean! Then I look toward another, this time a Frenchman but — he has lived and danced the tango in Buenos Aires! I am enjoying this game. My friends point out an 'authentic Parisian' and I stare unabashedly at him. He is about 20 feet from me. When he meets my eyes he shifts in place, looks to one side, then another; I continue staring. He looks at me as if wanting to dance, approaches in small circles, then moves away.



I decide to try my luck on someone else. At first he doesn't realize I am looking at him and when he does a look of surprise comes over his face—as if this has never happened before. Then he lowers his eyes; and so it goes again and again. During the entire evening not one *pure* Parisian asks me to dance. *Guys*, I want to tell them, *just because I want to dance with you doesn't mean I want to take you home!*

Maybe my Parisian female friends are correct about their countrymen. "Let's face it," one of them says, "99% of French men in tango have deep psychological problems with women—they are scared to death!" In Buenos Aires women are told not to be afraid of the close embrace in tango. "Don't worry," the teachers say, "you will not get pregnant." Perhaps someone ought to explain to French men that a three-minute dance does not mean marriage.... And how do you say *commitment-phobia* in French?

I know it's too early to draw conclusions, I will need to sample many more dances to give an assessment. And is it only Frenchmen who have such great fears?



Tango "Fireworks Week" 2001 A Review by Michael Golde

Forget barbeques, fireworks and the usual Fourth of July fanfare, the center of my universe during the holiday week was the Crown Plaza Hotel in Redondo Beach, California. The event: *Tango Fireworks Week 2001* — the first and, perhaps, annual tango "congress" in southern California hosted by Linda Valentino. Linda, a resident LA milonguera and host of a weekly milonga, organized this extravaganza featuring none other than Pablo Veron, Milena Plebs and a supporting cast of lesser-known Argentine Tango professionals. The truth is: the draw was Señor Veron and he did not disappoint.

This weeklong event, with participants from all over the United States to as far away as London, Paris, Hong Kong and Japan, consisted of choices from up to sixteen classes a day in four time slots divided into Basic, Intermediate and Advanced with a 'catchall' category titled 'Milonga/Vals.' Classes in one and a half hour segments started daily at 11 a.m. and ended around 7 p.m. Rest breaks were provided with complimentary beverages and fresh fruit between the classes; there was an hour break for lunch. Every evening a milonga started at 9 pm and lasted to approximately 1 am for those who needed no rest from the day's events — or with just no respect for their feet.

Having danced Argentine Tango myself for nearly two years, I pre-registered for mostly Intermediate classes with



a smattering of the other levels/categories for good measure. The classes, not surprisingly, were somewhat overpopulated by women –not that I'm complaining — but gender-balance was fairly well maintained at least early in the week. This parity broke down as the week pro-

gressed and attendees flocked to certain teachers, key among whom were Pablo and Milena, without regard to prior schedule commitments. Although I had originally planned to pace myself a bit and only take a maximum of three classes a day, I ended up taking a class in every time slot available. Most people were similarly undisciplined.

The variety of classes was a testament to the diversity of the faculty and the organizational skills of Linda and her staff. A sampling of the classes included: **Dancing the Pauses, Front and Back Boleos, Adornments and Embellishments, Improvisation, Musicality, Enrosques and Sacadas** and various levels of milonga and vals instruction for a total of 83 classes during the week. As I alluded to above, each participant was encouraged to preregister for the classes of his or her choosing to lock in one's top choices and to maintain a reasonable gender balance.

As it eventually turned out, I took the vast bulk of my classes from Pablo and Milena and their respective partners. My first impression of Veron was a strange mixture of familiarity and surprise. I seemed to 'know' this man intimately from my repeated viewing of *The Tango Lesson*; yet I had never met him before, let alone been in his presence. My surprise: now I was - a student in his tango lesson. He looked exactly as he did in the movie, particularly the recognizable hair and goatee-style beard though now fashionably bespectacled in wire frames with a light bluish tint on the lenses. He was a star, and his confidence and appearance exuded it. As for his new partner, Noel Stazza — a childhood friend of our own Federico Costantino she possessed a delicate and serene-like quality that contrasted sharply with his glitz. Of medium-height in tango heels with a ballerina-type body, her facial features were soft and both her skin and hair had a light bronze glow to them. A perfect follower to showcase Pablo's creative and intuitive dancing style, Noel is an elegant dancer in her own right but clearly a supporting player for Pablo's leading role.

I did take a few classes from other instructors, Nestor & Patricia and Julio & Corina, but was not able to attend any classes taught by the so-called milonga master, Omar, and his partner, Valeria. I would give a thumbs down to Nestor & Patricia as instructors largely due to language difficulties and an overall lack of preparation; Nestor also seemed to have more of a desire to perform than to teach. It seemed like they were creating the agenda for the particular class in real time and apparently others agreed. By the end of the workshop, their classes were not widely attended.

As for Julio & Corina, I appreciated their energy and enthusiasm but just didn't click with their style. Their improvisation classes turned out to be little more than formalized practicas; I was expecting to learn some different ways of using common tango elements to "improvise," obtaining a better feel of when and where to veer from normal dancing patterns and utilizing "phrasing" creatively. I was under-whelmed particularly in comparison to the "star" couples discussed below. To be fair, many of my fellow students gave them high marks and their classes seemed to draw a loyal following. For my money and time, the other available alternatives seemed better options.

As for Pablo Veron, one must experience his mastery of the tango in person to fully appreciate it. In a seemingly effortless manner, he has the ability to dazzle and mesmerize his audience with his tango fluency and creativity utilizing the simplest of movements to the most complex. He creates so intuitively and with such ease that it appears to be nothing more than child's play for him. Yet, through his explanations it became clear to me that nothing is mere rote for him and each movement, no matter how complex and intricate, has a purpose. A *boleo*, or any movement or combination, is not an end in itself but a means to link his unique phrasing together to form a whole – a self-contained fluent language within each dance. This intangible quality, in my estimation, is what separates him from his "peers" and catapults him to a higher level like Michael Jordan in basketball or, perhaps more apt, Mikhail Barishnikov in ballet.

As he essentially expressed himself, his goal was not to teach steps but to teach us the building blocks to create our own steps and style — to understand how each movement relates to the next movement and so on. And if one could absorb only a small portion of his precise physical movements, that was largely unimportant. The point was to start using what one knows to create and to begin to dance the language not of arbitrary movements but of movements flowing from one another to form an innately complete whole.

Veron's teaching style, though not overly warm, was professional and accessible. He provided personalized attention to those requesting it and to others having difficulty with various aspects of a class. As I later learned, his reputation was one of aloofness combined with boredom; I must dissent from this viewpoint based on my personal experience and the enthusiastic response of my fellow classmates.

He did, however, carefully control the right to use his physical image. Though the rest of the instructors allowed a final summary of their classes to be taped for inclusion in the workshop highlights video, Pablo did not allow any portion of his classes to be photographed or videotaped. I also heard, but was unable to confirm, that his private lessons were going for the rate of \$300 for 45 minutes. While I was disappointed that none of his classes were taped, I can also understand a creative artist's right not to give away his "asset," i.e., his economic right to derive income

Tango Fantasy 2001 6th Annual United States Tango Congress

May 25 through June 2, 2001 - Miami Beach, FL

Tango Fantasy 2001 was the fifth annual United States Tango Congress (USTC) in Miami. Under the successful organization of Lydia Henson and Randy Pittman, it has evolved into a 'must attend' event for many tangueros and tangueras from across the United States as well as other parts of the world. The entire Tango Fantasy package encompassed 9 evening milongas and 7 full days of tango classes running from the weekend preceding Memorial Day through the following weekend; for the last several years the Congress has been held at the Fontainebleau Hilton Resort and Spa right beside Miami Beach.

Not only were several features of *Tango Fantasy* improved this year but also Chicago sported a much better representation. A total of **20** participants from our local tango community attended: in addition to Leroy Hearon, Jr, his third time to Miami, and myself for the second time, a whole host of Chicago regulars could be found there: Steve Pressling and Marisella Guerra; Will Maricondia; Lita Amigleo; Antonio & Lydia Cosantino; Luis Gallo and Nicki Holcutt; Bob Dronski and Kathleen Kreher; Bob Brazil and Denise Gillespie; Jose and Jerry Caravantes; Evan Ellman; and, Joyce O'Connor participated in at least 1 event and several were there for the entire 7 days of classes and 9 nights of milongas!

These events obviously are fabulous opportunities to learn from the masters; this year's line-up added Miguel Angel Zotto & Soledad Rivero along with Carlos Gavito & Marcella Duran to an already impressive faculty that included: Juan Carlos Copes & Johana Copes; Fabian Salas & Carolina del Rivero; Osvaldo Zotto & Lorena Ermocida; Guillermo & Fernanda Merlo; Facundo & Kely Posadas; and, for the final weekend when Julio Iglesias called away Osvaldo and Lorena, Nito and Elba joined the staff. There are a total of 16 classes offered each day - in 4 different time slots - for seven full days. This year Lorena added 2 women's technique classes at the end of the day and Fabian & Carolina added a saltos (jumps) class late one afternoon as well. This meant that you could take 5 classes in each of 3 days, dancing from 10 am to 8 pm and then starting again at the milonga from 9pm til 2 am if you so desired! The week starts with a Friday night milonga before classes begin on Saturday and there is a milonga on the 2nd Saturday night with no classes during the day.

One of the best aspects of attending such events is the exceptionally high overall quality of dancing at the evening milongas. In fact, some people travel to Miami JUST for the milongas and do not take advantage of the superb, internationally renowned instructors. You always see people you've met last year or at other conferences and meet so many new people from around the country and world. Each night's milonga took place on a 3,800 sq. ft. ballroom floor and featured live music for a portion of the

evening as well as a live performance either by participating instructors or by local youth or adult dancers. A very positive change this year at the milongas was featuring DJ's from around the country to supplement the live music. This had several benefits: Randy Pittman, one of the two primary organizers along with his partner, Lydia Henson, wasn't so stressed out by being the DJ every night; we were able to hear a greater variety of music; the guest DJ's had their music computerized so that at the official end of the milonga they could leave the programmed music running as long as feet held out! In addition to our own Bob Dronski, who thoughtfully brought *chacarera* music for us one night, Keith Elshaw of Montreal, Victor Crichton of St. Pete/Tampa, Manuel Patino of Atlanta and Tito Restucha of Raleigh assisted Randy in providing wonderful evenings of dancing until 2 or 3 am.

The last 2 evenings featured special performances: Friday night was the showcase of all the instructors, and this year it was presented in the hotel's nightclub, so the viewing was superior to last year. Saturday is the competition for slots to represent the U.S. in the international *DanceSport* competition. This year 4 couples – respectively from Miami, Denver, St. Petersburg and Kansas City – out of 8 were selected to compete this September, again in Miami.

Although the *Tango Fantasy* is held at the outstanding Fontainebleau Hilton in Miami Beach, one of the drawbacks is that you have to decide whether to miss some classes in order to take advantage of the pools, beaches, water slide, and other amenities of South Beach. Perhaps Randy and Lydia will consider a mid-week 'free' day as is done with CITA in Buenos Aires. They did start classes an hour later this year which helped some — especially since the evening milongas ran much later.

Thanks go out to Charlotte Vickstrom and *The Chicago Tango Club* as well as to Bob and Kathy for helping spread the word about this great event. You can attend for a night, a day, a few classes, the weekend package, the week package or the entire 9 milongas with performances and 7 days of classes. We hope to see more of you there next year.

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from his physical image, and for people to pay his going rate for privates and the like.

Milena Plebs must also be given her due. Although billed as a replacement for Osvaldo Zotto and Lorena due to a scheduling conflict with the extended Julio Iglesias tour, she is no mere fill-in. Milena, a star of *Tango X 2* and a former dance partner and wife of Miguel Zotto, has been at the upper echelon of the Tango world for many years and is particularly well-known for her precise technique and incomparable ability to embellish her movements with style and sensuality. Her seemingly free-spirited nature and distinctive look – long hair, short skirts and legs sculpted by her years of tango ardor – only added to her appeal.

Her newest partner, Ezequiel, is a powerful and elegant leader and, in my view, an up-and-coming star in his own right, though presently overshadowed by Milena's reputation. Their classes were always filled to the max and their overall style and teaching method seemed to attract the widest audience throughout the week. Their classes, for which they did allow a summary to be taped while also posing for pictures, invariably received enthusiastic applause and accolades. From a purely instructional point of view and in terms of personal attention to students — which was given graciously and in abundance to all — *I would rank them the best teaching couple of the workshop*.

All things considered, **Tango Fireworks 2001** was a first-rate event. I learned a great deal and, especially due to Pablo Veron, it brought to me a new perspective on the way Tango should be danced. I thoroughly enjoyed the experience and would heartily recommend it should it be reprised on the same scale next year under Linda Valentino's leadership.
