


The Rhythm of Pots Pans

his time when I arrive in Buenos Aires I am greeted by the rhythm of banging pots and pans. The economic situation has reached a low point and the political climate is becoming unsteady. There are demonstrations everywhere, marches along the main avenue that connects the president's house — casa rosada — to the house of Congress and beyond. Daily, crowds gather before the government houses, or the plaza before the presidential house, or in front of any number of major banks.

Men and women bang pots and demand a change in policy. Nobody knows what that change ought to be, only that the present situation is impossible.

A couple of months ago Argentina became the first country in history to declare bankruptcy — an out and out declaration of its inability to pay its debts, and therefore an outright reneging on its loans. 'We are out of the game,' they said, 'tough luck.' Perhaps an economist can explain the intricacies of this, what I know is what is on the surface — the conspicuous



effects on the nation of this action.

Suddenly the peso has lost value, instead of being equal to the dollar as it has for the last few years, it is now at 1.80 pesos to the dollar and the disparity rises each day. Within a week it is at 2 to 1, and in a few weeks it jumps to 3 to 1. A good steak dinner with a bottle of red wine in a neighborhood restaurant is under 10 pesos and a taxi ride from the airport to the center of town a mere 25 pesos. For those of us with dollars the whole country is at a 50% discount and dropping.

But for the natives this is disaster. Savings in dollars when converted to pesos devalued portfolios by half, and banks only allow a portion to be withdrawn per month. Money is held hostage in the corralito, Argentineans say — in the 'little corral.' Salaries are frozen so buying power has dropped drastically. Worse yet, prices for essentials —public transportation, food items — are beginning to rise.

The general feeling of desperation is obvious and with the future turning bleaker it can only lead to complete hopelessness, rage and rebellion. Will a military coup follow? They tell me this is out of the question, but I have seen what a society on the brink of disaster can do; I certainly would not rule out any possibility. As the chilling words on graffiti along a city wall declare — 'Today pots and pans, Tomorrow the end!'

A Perfume of Tango in L.A.

ango in L.A. is an exciting combination of drama meeting the dramatic! Last March on a trip to visit my family, I returned to several of the milongas that I had visited on a previous trip. There is a big tango community in Southern California; they are very enthusiastic and the milongas are well attended. Even my mother, aunt and sister looked forward to our evenings of tango.

The **Westwood Milonga**, managed by Michael Espinoza and Yolanda Rossi, is held on Friday nights and proved to be one of my favorites. We arrived around 9pm and the crowd was still light. A notebook for newcomers to jot down their information was provided at the entrance. Next to this area was a wonderful display of tango shoes for both women and men. They were very stylish and available in a variety of colors. I found this idea very interesting and practical, but you need to a have a high limit on your credit card!

The cover charge for this milonga was \$12, which included a one-hour tango lesson along with the dance itself. A refreshments buffet is included in the price as well. Our hosts provided a very large and delicious variety of dishes and snacks: bowls of potato salad and pasta salad, a round of Brie cheese as well as a ring of sliced cheddar surrounded by grapes, apricots and other fruits. Next to that was a very beautifully arranged basket of apples, oranges and other fruits. In addition to the healthy food they had really great snacks like chips and dip, a good variety of nuts, lots of pastries, cakes, cookies and candy. The beverages included soft drinks, water, and bottles of red and white wine. This was a wonderful buffet offered for a very affordable price.

The dancing area was set up very similar to *Tango...Nada Mas* with small round tables surrounding the dance floor along with a larger table that displayed the Argentinean flag. The walls were thoroughly decorated with photographs of famous tango dancers. The floors seemed smooth and nicely waxed – the lighting was soft and inviting for an evening of dancing tango.

We arrived just after the tango class had concluded and the crowd was light. Our milonga hosts warmly greeted us; they were very friendly. As more people began to arrive, the dance floor began filling up with many creative dancers. Most of the couples incorporated features from other dances into their interpretation of Argentine tango. It was like watching a tango show because everyone seemed to be trying to perform the very best moves that they knew! My sister and aunt were so impressed by this tango show that they doubted whether they would ever be able to learn the dance. It was very interesting to be able just to sit back and enjoy watching them all dancing.

Very soon we were being asked to dance. For me the main challenge was the need to adjust a little bit to both their dramatic style of dancing and, at times, very speedy pace around the dance floor. I found this to be a little distracting and stressful given how crowded the floor was. The dancing continued at this intense pace until around midnight when our host came out and talked about some upcoming tango events; he welcomed all the out-of-towners and announced the birthdays.



Anyway, I think that it was a very interesting experience to be there and to get to know the Los Angeles tango community. Most importantly for me, it is so nice to be a part of something so international. I have the impression that anywhere we want to go these days, with a little bit of research, we will be able to find a tango community where we can find kindred spirits and many virtual friends. The key to this wonderful network is being able to dance tango; you start dancing and, sometime after that, very nice people introduce themselves very kindly – and that's it! I find it delightful to be a part of something like that.

The Bazaar of Embraces

If there were no encounters there would be no need to speak of separations. Meetings and farewells marked by the implacable succession of tandas: tango, milonga, tango vals, tango. Meetings and farewells, hopes, disillusions, and new hopes.

The embrace is simply a prelude to a new farewell. The soothing embrace of a familiar body, the disquieting embrace of one to be discovered. The *cortina* marks the end of the *tanda*; the dancers return to their tables without looking back..

A little sip, perhaps a cigarette, a brief commentary to the table companions and once more the eyes begin to stalk. Looks cross or evade each other, sometimes both –timid, bold, or defying.

"He saw me! But no, he's looking the other way!"
"Is he asking me or the one on my side?" "Maybe the one behind..." She resists the temptation to look over her shoulder. Then the

roaming glance stops – it has found its target. With a sure aim it insists, caresses, penetrates.

They rise. He walks toward her. She straightens out her skirt, fusses with her hair, then stands at the edge of the dance floor, waiting for him. Like two strangers – even if they've danced together many times – with the slightest greeting the rite begins anew.

Sometimes there is a promise of other tangos – "the next Pugliese" or "where will you dance next Friday?" Sometimes there is an invitation to have coffee after. Then another separation. With the final chords of the tanda, they leave the dance floor exchanging a civil, "thank you," and moving away without looking back – like two strangers.

And then there will be other days, other milongas – the travelers who come from the north and the friends who go away on their journeys. The milonga is forever there – a witness to each meeting and each farewell until the final farewell that ends all the painful small goodbyes.

An Interview with Connie Orbeta By Yanira Collado

Yanira: As a visual artist who dances tango you must be aware that there are many symbols or images that are used to represent tango – for example an embrace, musical notes and, as in your piece, shoes. But these symbols alone do and can mean other things. How does the image you have provided for this month's cover and the textures of it represent tango to you?

Connie: Many apparently ordinary, everyday things connected with tango have come – through my years of experience with the dance – to be charged with a greater meaningfulness for me; and so, of course, many apparently mundane things associated with the dance now operate symbolically for me. I chose the shoes for this painting to represent the mystery and the intrigue of tango. The red and black high heel shoes are meant to invoke a complex of associations we all have had: the many steps we dance on a particular night; the experience of tired feet; the way we are drawn, magnetically, to the sensuous tap of a woman's embellishment; the beautiful line of a woman's leg and foot. I have also added a man's shoe in the painting to lend the image a strong masculine element.

Overall, for me the painting operates in that 'gray area' of mystery just like tango does. For a moment just think about it: how strange it is that we can all feel with such strength that this painting of red shoes is, unquestionably, about tango – that it is somehow *symbolic* of tango. It – whether I mean by this the dance *or* the painting – has a life of its own. Through the visual evocativeness of this image I want the viewer to create his or her own scenario by provoking them to ask questions which in the end they may not quite be aware they are actually asking, much less answering. What is the time of this image? What is their story? Are they in Paris? Buenos Aries? Are they new lovers? Are they life partners?

Yanira: Was there a selective process you went through in determining colors and textures that made this particular image more fully exemplify how you experience tango?

Connie: I did not have a predetermined color scheme before I started other than I felt that the shoes needed to be black and red. The colors and textures evolved before my eyes. I wanted to create a warm passionate environment, and it just happened. The textures added another layer of richness to the painting. The silks and lace add a feminine delicate touch. The ebb and flow of the garments are like that of the dance between a man and a woman.

Yanira: Has the process of crossing tango, which is an art form – a dance – that you yourself practice, with visual art been a process that has come quite naturally for you?

Connie: It is a natural process since both the dance and visual art are expressions of my personal feelings, experiences, all those items of my inner life. My two artistic mediums are tango and art.

Yanira: In what direction(s) would you like to take your images of tango next?

Connie: I have already taken the original painting in new directions - ones offered by the techniques of digital imaging art. There are three pieces in this issue of *Tango Noticias* that evolved from the painting. Adobe Photoshop was used to enhance the textures and richness in a process that 'veiled' the traditional painting. Textures such as lace, a delicate rose or a chrome car grid were superimposed on the base painting electronically; typography and hand written tango lyrics were also added to create a new dimension. A rich, sensuous, 'digitally-enhanced' texture transformed the traditional art. I like to think of this process as one of veiling the more traditional image with these digital modifications. Each successive veil – whether that of the superimposed rose, the lace, the car grid – operates as an interpretation of the original symbol – the red shoes. Thus, through one veil I invoke the rhythms of tango. With another superimposed image suddenly we have contemporary tango, a blend of the old infused with the new. Thus, through digital modifications I am able to be continually oriented toward a traditional core - my original image of the shoes - along with implying many layers of new interpretations.



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
