"It will cost you a fortune to fix it up."

"I have the resources to get it fixed," he replied, undaunted by my lack of optimism. I have to admit that, by now, his enthusiasm was starting to be contagious.

"OK" I said, "let's look at the possibilities." The place was spacious. It could easily hold over 100 people, with plenty of space for dancing. I started getting in my head the picture my friend had been holding in his for quite a while.

"I'll get the ceiling fixed and put down a great maple or oak floor for dancing. I'll set up round little tables for 2 or 4 to give it a cozy feeling. I want it to look and feel like a milonga in Buenos Aires."

Then came his most astonishing announcement yet: "I'm going to paint the walls red."

"Red? Are you opening a

you who know how irreverent I can be know I would have no problem saying something like and said something about the origins of tango being in bordellos, so red would be very fitting.

"Red will give it a warm feeling" was his answer. We talked about a couple of other minor issues. At the end of our talk, I gave him the name of a guy I knew could handle the whole remodeling project and we left.

I did not come back to the place until the day before opening night. When I walked in I thought I was in the wrong place! A magnificent dance floor was being waxed and polished. The ceiling was no longer giving us obscene gestures. Instead, there had been installed a very good lighting system that could make the place as bright as daylight, or as dark and romantic as needed. A powerful sound system was in place. And, of course, the walls passionate red.

Throughout the remodeling process we had talked about names for the place. I had suggested names like Tango Bar, La Cumparsita or Tango Corner. My friend wanted a name more in tune with what he wanted to In the end, he accomplish. picked a name from a very famous tango titled: Una emo-

Opening night came. Mv friend got on the floor, welcomed all of us and announced the official opening of the place he had decided to call Tango...Nada Mas. This was more than just a name; it was to be a way of life. My friend knew that he could make a lot of money renting out his place for other functions, yet he decided to dedicate his place

milonga or a bordello?" Those of exclusively to tango. His passion and love for tango were greater than his desire to make money.

By now of course you know this. But my friend just laughed that my friend is Bob Dronski. Both Bob and his wife, Kathy, worked endless hours to make TNM a great milonga. Those who are familiar with running a milonga know how time-consuming preparations can be to make sure the food, drinks, music, set-ups etc. are just right. Those who attend milongas will just have to take my word for it running a milonga takes a lot of time and hard work.

But Bob did not stop there. He also wanted to make *TNM* a place where people could learn how to dance tango. He and Kathy taught a lot of classes. He spent a lot of money advertising and trying to bring new people to the community. And the most important thing of all: he brought to Chicago the best tango teachers available: Gavito and Marcela, Carlos and Alicia, Facundo and were a nice, soft shade of dark, Kelly, Nito and Elba, Leandro and Andrea - to name only some of the most prominent ones.

> And now, it all has come to an end. Bob has just announced that Tango...Nada Mas is closed. The closing of TNM is a great loss to the Chicago tango community. It deprives the community of the most elegant place to dance tango on a Saturday night, but, above all, it leaves a feeling of emptiness in those of us who know how passionate Bob is about tango.

I attended the first milonga at TNM. I did not have the heart to attend the last one. However, I think I speak for the community at large when I say we will miss Tango...Nada Mas. It really is the end of an era in Chicago.


