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# THREE CHICAGO TANGUEROS IN SCANDINA SCA

OPENHAGEN was the first destination in Scandanavia for three tangueros from Chicago. We, Netza Roldan, Norm Hoffberg and Babette Klein, met for a few days of Danish milongas and dancing with new, exciting and unknown partners before we headed to the Tango Camp in Sweden. When Babette arrived, Netza and Norm had already been checking out the beautiful Scandinavian women for a couple of days. Our heads did not stop turning for the three days while sightseeing together tooling around on bicycles all over the city!

We had the opportunity to attend many milongas held outdoors while staying in Copenhagen. On one warm and crystal clear Scandinavian summer afternoon we heard soft strains of tango as we approached the ocean. As the music became louder and as we got closer to the harbor, we saw tangueros dancing on wooden decks overlooking the Malmo harbor. The sun was so bright, the breeze was cool and the deck was surrounded by sun worshippers. The scene was almost surreal. We joined the dancers and the music on the deck next to the ocean. It was an experience unlike any in the Midwest of the U.S.

The next afternoon as we approached a large gazebo, we looked at each other wondering, were we where we belong? Again tango filled the air and crescendoed as we neared the wooden gazebo in the



woods. When we entered, we were taken away by dancers filling the floor and the excitement of the music. The energy filled the room and the dancers floated over the floor. This was only a three hour milonga because the priest that lived next door insisted on going to bed by 10:00 p.m.

Even so, we met people traveling for sixty miles just to have the opportunity to dance for three hours.

One Saturday night we traveled over the river and entered the new Cultural Center along its banks. The large room was filled with music and people, an inspiring site. This milonga was much more formal; the dancers were more formally dressed and the setting brought all the elements together: the music, the art and the passion.

We also appreciated and took advantage of the city's "white nights". After













ending one milonga at 2:30 a.m. one night, a group of ten of us proceeded on bikes to a local bar, which we closed at 4:30 a.m. At 5:30 a.m. we found ourselves at the Danish Parliament building where we cranked up the CD player in one dancer's car and had a "Volvomilonga" on the steps of Parliament until 6:30 a.m. With a sunset at 10:30 p.m. and a sunrise at 3:30 a.m. our body clocks adjusted so we were never fatigued.

Copenhagen is a cosmopolitan city with small town charm and warmth. It is very clean, colorful and full of friendly people who almost all speak English. This made it especially easy to get around and communicate with the locals. One evening we were fortunate to be invited to the home of one of Netza's friends, Katrine Helman, who prepared an unforgettable candlelight dinner for us with a delicious baked salmon and tiny new potatoes and lots of warm, lively conversation. Another evening we went out to dinner with a group of young Swedish dancers we met at a seaside milonga in Malmo, Sweden, just an hour train ride from Copenhagen. This same group came out to the Tango Camp for the Friday and Saturday milongas and stayed at a nearby camping ground. Friday evening they invited us to a barbeque outside the cabin they had rented and introduced us to the Swedish custom of singing naughty ditties (in Swedish, of course!) and drinking shots of schnaps!

After 5 exciting days full of breathtaking beauty, great fun and endless fantastic tango in Copenhagen and Denmark, we took a 3 hour train ride that would take us to the Tango Camp site. It was 12:20pm on Wednesday, July 21, 2005 when the three Tangueros from Chicago arrived at the Tylosand Hotel, a beautiful resort located

on the west coast of Sweden, just outside the village of Halmsted. This resort is famous in Sweden for having the best spa in the country.

As we check in, Netza happily ran into several Scandinavian friends that he met last year at the camp and who also decided to return to this wonderful event. The Tango Camp, in its sixth year, is a unique event where all participants eat, sleep, learn, practice, dance and party in the same location. The camp includes 12 hours of tango classes, 4 marathon milongas that run until 6:00 am, live music, performances and a wonderful place to rest and enjoy yourself along the beaches of the hotel.

The large Tylosand Hotel where the Tango Camp took place was overlooking the Baltic Sea. The accommodations were excellent and Babette signed up for a double room and found a lovely woman from Stockholm as a roommate. The hotel had a swimming pool, jacuzzi and complete spa, which we all enjoyed between classes. You could also walk out of the hotel onto the beach, which offered Netza and Norm the added attraction of many beautiful sunbathers!

The Tango Camp was organized to perfection by Pino D'angiola and his wife Natalie Brateli. They were attentive to every detail and were very gracious hosts. For the workshops we had to sign up for a specific level of dance beforehand and the classes were set up with equal amounts of men and women. If you didn't already have a partner you could register without one in advance and the organizers would assist you in finding a partner at your level. Often we were left to dance with our partner but other times we were encouraged to

rotate. The teachers for the Tango Camp included: Fabian Salas and Carolina del Rivero; Chicho Frumboli and Eugenia Parrilla; Esteban Moreno and Claudia Codega; Damian Esell and Nancy Louzan; Julio Balmaceda and Corina de la Rosa; Eduardo Cappussi and Mariana Flores; and Pino D'angiola & Natalie Brateli . All of the teachers were excellent and each level of dance had classes with at least three of the teaching couples. There were two, twohour classes a day, between which there was usually a two or three hour break, which gave us time to socialize, sleep, take a walk on the beach or go to the nearest town on a bus.


Every year the Tango Camp grows with more people and every year, the participants leave thrilled by the wonderful experience and joy they receive from this event. While the organization of the Camp by Pino and Natalie is wonderful and the classes are really worthwhile, what you can really get out of the Tango Camp in Sweden is the unparalleled experience of sharing your love of tango with so many people from around the world. In a brief period of time your tango horizons are broadened by the exposure to this international community. Even though the level of dancing is higher than that of the Midwestern U.S. and even though Scandinavia is so far away, the marvelous world of tango makes it feel so close and so deep that every day you have a different feeling that makes you want to come back again and again.

The "Carlos Gavito Salon" at the Dandi Royal Mansion in Buenos Aires

ROUND THE WORLD special events have been taking place to honor the late Carlos Gavito. Many milongas have been dedicated to his memory and many glasses have been raised to toast the man that exemplified tango fo so many people.

In order to pay homage to Gavito in Buenos Aires, the Dandi Royal Mansion, where Gavito taught classes during 2004, has dedicated one of the rooms in the mansion to him. This room is now called the Carlos Gavito Salon and is the same room where he had been teaching his last tango classes. In addition to the dedication the room will have a permanent display of Gavito's personal items donated by his family.

Carlos Gavito was celebrated in his city even before his death. At the El Beso milonga a cocktail on the menu was named after him. One style of tailored suits worn by some professional dancers was called the "Gavito Cut" because it is one that he personally designed with special attributes for dancing tango (for example the sleeve of the left arm is longer than the right so when the leader holds up his left arm the suit will not be pulled down).

Many more dedications and memorials are planned to honor Gavito's legacy. In the near future a plaque will be installed in his resting place by the local government to commemorate him. It is only fitting that such a legend should be remembered in this way.


