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HOT TANGO FESTIVALS

Meet in the Middle Mt. Vernon, Missouri

The third festival I went to was the second edition of Meet in the Middle in Mt. Vernon, Missouri Aug. 4-7. It is not in the middle for Chicagoans, but three of us traveled there: Greg Hoffenkamp, Jim Halas and I.

I drove into town the day before the festival started so I explored the town of 4,017. It has a Ben Franklin, a traditional dime store with multiple flavors of fudge and sarsaparilla, (which heroic cowboys used to drink in saloons in Western movies instead of whiskey). It also has a courthouse square where Karen Whitesell, the host of the festival, has her beautifully renovated building. She makes stained glass art and rents her space for weddings and other events. She has a beautiful upstairs space with a very nice wooden floor that is perfect for tango. She provided floors and bathrooms for those with sleeping bags and housed the teachers and performers

> too. She also varnished the theater stage by herself in preparation for the Saturday night performance.

This festival was different from the other two because Karen provided meals for the three days and snacks for late-night tango. An ice cream truck came on Saturday and Sunday, which was very popular. She scheduled live music from Tango Lorca from Kansas City. Saturday

night, and she also asked Korey Ireland to set up a performance in a brand new theater. An audience of 220--about double the number of festival dancers--attended.

This festival attracted 107 dancers. There were groups from Kansas City, Tulsa, St. Louis, Springfield (MO), Arkansas and a few from Iowa, Florida, Texas and Colorado. Others came from other Missouri towns like St. Louis and Springfield. The level of experience in tango ranged from a few months to over eight years. What I have learned from all this is to try not to plan what will happen at a given place except that it is usual to be exhausted from all the possibilities... Tango is a small world but one which requires lots of shoes and clothes.

Karen imported Robert Hauk from Portland and his partner Barbara Durr from Atlanta and Robin Thomas and Jennifer Bratt from New York to teach and perform. The men were also dj's and popular dance partners. Ney Melo, also from New York, was a partner in several dances performed at the theater. Mila also sang and danced, alone and with Korey, during the performance.

For me the best parts of the festival were the performances. Korey and his compatriots put together an entertaining and professional event despite the very hot, airless room and fiercely hot red lighting. Korey and Mila were outstanding because they did more than dance in traditional ways. In addition to their dramatic choreographed dances, Korey played the bandeneon along with Tango Lorca, who also played one of his compositions. It is hard to imagine a Russian woman could sing in Spanish as beautifully and convincingly as Mila did. The others danced much more informally, much as if they were dancing socially, though Jennifer had a more formal presentation too.

Though the venue was not large, there still was the natural tendency of group members to dance mostly with their friends, but there was some mixing up as well. It was nice to meet more of the men in classes. I had not had classes with Jennifer and Robin before so I took their class, which was more salon than milongero. I discovered that one Tulsa man had taken lessons with my teachers' teachers in Chicago. I knew dancing with him felt more familiar than dancing with some others. Milongero/close embrace was prevalent there.

I loved the music from Tango Lorca too. In addition to the music during the performance, we had music during dinner and music during the milonga. I already had a Tango Lorca cd which is nearly worn out from playing it so I was especially happy to hear the music live. Tango Lorca also played during dinner and at the milonga. I enjoyed the dancing too because I got to dance with some excellent partners. One tanda hit my all-time favorite list along with the creative tanda in Montreal.

The attraction of festivals

So what is it about these festivals which attracted me? I usually consider the teachers first though I knew few of the teachers in any of these three festivals. Location was important in choosing these festivals because I could drive to two, but it was the prospect of adventurous tango that was always the most important, of course.

In Montreal's case it was Montreal with its deserved reputation for high-level dancing. In addition to the importation of skilled teachers I wanted to see what that reputation looked like on the dance floor. I also wanted to explore the city, but I had very little time and energy left.

Location was a factor for choosing the St. Louis festival. It was easy to get to, and it was something special to do over the 4th. I had danced in St. Louis before so I thought it would be friendly and fun which it was. The Mt. Vernon festival was attractive because several dancers had told how much fun they had last year. It was nice to have meals and treats provided, but it was a long drive.

The Mt. Vernon festival took the prize for the most formal. Montreal women have a reputation for being very chic so I was afraid that would mean very chic milonga attire, but it did not. There were jeans and dresses with pants under them, some costumes and some beautiful dresses too. but everyone danced together. St. Louis attire was not formal, but the impression in my head was wiped out by the heat. But in Mount Vernon, the men were more formally dressed Saturday night than I have ever witnessed. At least for a while some men even wore jackets before they stripped down to shirts because of the heat at the milonga (quite hot but not unbearable). There were some women who were more formally attired than usual too. One woman wore a red ruffled dress with a full skirt. If I remember correctly, she also wore long gloves with a rhinestone armband.

What I have learned from all this is to try not to plan what will happen at a given place except that it is usual to be exhausted from all the possibilities. Each place will be different though some of the same people you know will probably be there. Tango is a small world but one which requires lots of shoes and clothes.



Foundation Class
